



Wishing Tree Poster and Instructions





Wishing Trees are found in many different cultures around the world and although the specific rituals differ from one country to the next, all Wishing Trees are places where people reconnect with what truly matters to them.

People are invited to make wishes by hanging trinkets, colourful ribbons and fabrics, or writing wishes on small pieces of paper and hanging them on the 'tree'.

Yoko Ono's Wishing Tree project is one of the most famous examples. So far she has collected more than one million wishes from people all over the world. The wishes on the Wishing Tree are left to hang for everyone to see, representing everyone's dreams, both big and small.

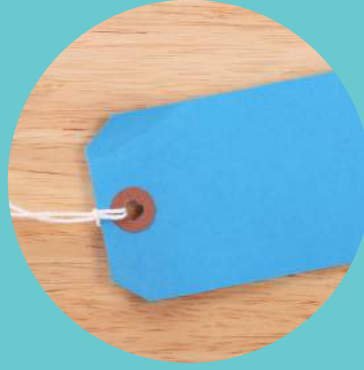
Step 1

Gather the materials from home - luggage tags or a piece of cardboard, hole punch, felt pens, coloured wool, stickers.



Step 2

Make a wish and write it down on your luggage tag or piece of cardboard (punch a hole at the end) and add some coloured wool



Step 3

Fold it and secure with a sticker or piece of sticky tape



Step 4

Attach your Wishing Tag to an indoor plant or keep it safe at home and add it to our Wishing Tree once our office re-opens



Step 5

If you have any coloured thread leftover feel free to add it to your nominated 'wishing tree', wrap it around the branches



Step 6
